HEARING GOD'S WORD

FIRST LESSON

Deuteronomy 26:1-11

Once you enter the land that God, your God, is giving you as an inheritance and take it over and settle down, you are to take some of all the firstfruits of what you grow in the land that God, your God, is giving you, put them in a basket and go to the place God, your God, sets apart for you to worship him. At that time, go to the

priest who is there and say, "I announce to God, your God, today that I have entered the land that God promised our ancestors that he'd give to us." The priest will take the basket from you and place it on the Altar of God, your God. And there in the Presence of God, your God, you will recite:

A wandering Aramean was my father, he went down to Egypt and sojourned there, he and just a handful of his brothers at first, but soon they became a great nation, mighty and many. The Egyptians abused and battered us, in a cruel and savage slavery. We cried out to God, the God-of-Our-Fathers: He listened to our voice, he saw our destitution, our trouble, our cruel plight. And God took us out of Egypt with his strong hand and long arm, terrible and great, with signs and miracle-wonders. And he brought us to this place, gave us this land flowing with milk and honey. So here I am. I've brought the firstfruits of what I've grown on this ground you gave me, O God.

Then place it in the Presence of God, your God. Prostrate yourselves in the Presence of God, your God. And rejoice! Celebrate all the good things that God, your God, has given you and your family; you and the Levite and the foreigner who lives with you.

Luke 4:1-13

Now Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, left the Jordan and was led by the Spirit into the wild. For forty wilderness days and nights he was tested by the Devil. He ate nothing during those days, and when the time was up he was hungry.

The Devil, playing on his hunger, gave the first test: "Since you're God's Son, command this stone to turn into a loaf of bread."

Jesus answered by quoting Deuteronomy: "It takes more than bread to really live."

For the second test he led him up and spread out all the kingdoms of the earth on display at once. Then the Devil said, "They're yours in all their splendor to serve your pleasure. I'm in charge of them all and can turn them over to whomever I wish. Worship me and they're yours, the whole works."

Jesus refused, again backing his refusal with Deuteronomy: "Worship the Lord your God and only the Lord your God. Serve him with absolute single-heartedness."

For the third test the Devil took him to Jerusalem and put him on top of the Temple. He said, "If you are God's Son, jump. It's written, isn't it, that 'he has placed you in the care of angels to protect you; they will catch you; you won't so much as stub your toe on a stone'?"

"Yes," said Jesus, "and it's also written, 'Don't you dare tempt the Lord your God."

That completed the testing. The Devil retreated temporarily, lying in wait for another opportunity.

Music Notes:

Moses Hogan was a rising star in the world of African-American spirituals and his life was cut short with the sudden discovery of a brain tumor in 2003, which led to his untimely death. Moses was awarded a full scholarship to the Oberlin Conservatory of Music

where he studied piano and graduated in 1979 with a Bachelor of Music Degree. In 1980, he started his graduate studies at Juilliard School of Music, and later went to study classical music in Vienna, Austria. During his piano solo years, he won several competitions including first place at the 28th Annual Kosciuszko Foundation Chopin Competition in New York. The anthem "We shall walk..." was commissioned by the Calvin College (Michigan) Alumni Choir and gives us the eternal hope of "...see[ing] our loved ones there," for "Jesus himself will be our leader."

Mark Hayes has created a sumptuous arrangement of the classic spiritual "Give me Jesus." He resides in Kansas City where he composes full-time, in between guest spots directing, accompanying, or presenting workshops of his music. He has published over 850 compositions, including special arrangements for over 50 recordings. The text is a simple one: "In the morning when I rise...give me Jesus. You may have all this world...give me Jesus."


