50th Anniversary 1 October 2014



Fifty years ago, on October 1, 1964, a new shop opened its doors in Old Greenwich. This year that shop is celebrating its continuous success in the same location providing funds that support many worthy missions and charities. Located at 191 Sound Beach Avenue, previous site of a U.S. Post Office and later a hardware store, "the best little shop in town" is well-known as The Rummage Room.

How It All Began

Prior to 1964, The Women's Guild of The First Congregational Church of Greenwich held twice yearly rummage sales at the church. Those one-day events saw every available area of the church commandeered for the display of donated items that had been collected and sorted in "the rummage room." Sale day mornings found eager crowds lined up to buy armfuls of merchandise. The Guild happily made donations to many worthwhile local charities.

However, after the spring sale in 1964, a fortuitous two-fold problem occurred. A large volume of good items remained but the usual "rummage room" storage space at the Church was soon to be used for other purposes. That was when a few enterprising and fearless ladies of the Guild found the vacancy at 191 Sound Beach Avenue. They negotiated a six-month trial lease and a free month to set up shop. The monthly rent that first year was \$250.00. They were the grateful recipients of a donated cash register. The women set about cleaning, building shelves, painting, sorting merchandise and getting ready for opening day on October 1, 1964.

From the outset The Rummage Room was a success. Barbara Miller and Ruth Wright were the Co-Chairwomen of the project and through their hard work and that of the volunteers the shop was open all day on Thursdays and Fridays and a half-day on Saturdays. Five months later the Guild became The Women's Fellowship and voted to add Wednesdays to the store hours and to hire a paid manager. Soon the days of operation were extended to include Mondays and Tuesdays.

Betty Edgar became Co-Chairwoman with Ruth Wright in 1979. Subsequently, Betty served as Chairwoman and Volunteer Manager from 1985 until her retirement in 1991. Betty moved after retirement and passed away last year. A full-time manager, Deidre Little, was hired in 1992. The shop prospered with the addition of part-time assistant managers and a large cadre of community volunteers. Maria Drieghe and Debbi Stickney became Co-Managers in 2000. They continued to foster the friendly shopping atmosphere and attract willing volunteers who enjoyed the worthwhile work.

Today, Maria Drieghe is the Manager. She has the energy, creativity and managerial skills to keep the shop humming and the donations and sales increasing through the years. The Rummage Room would not be the same without her. She sets the tone that enables all volunteers to enjoy their service and fellowship with the other volunteers and the paid staff.

The Rummage Room at Fifty

We celebrate five decades of stunningly successful operation of The Rummage Room, an Old Greenwich village institution. Today The Rummage Room is a model for area not-for-profit thrift shops. Professional Manager, Maria Drieghe oversees the operations from donations through sales. She supervises the part-time assistant managers and a roster of approximately 60 dedicated community volunteers.

The award-winning display windows that are created throughout the year are enjoyed by the entire Old Greenwich community. Using donated items, the windows range from formal attire and wedding gowns to Halloween costumes, back-to-school, and theme designs that represent all the holidays of the year. The volunteers and staff are fun-loving too. Check out the windows on April Fool's Day to spot some live models!

Where Does the Money Go?

Oversight for the shop and staff is handled by a committee of The Women's Fellowship of The First Congregational Church of Greenwich. The committee meets monthly with the manager to map strategy and offer support. The treasurer of this committee monitors all the income and operating expenses, including rent and payroll. Meanwhile, The Women's Fellowship Allocations Committee studies a long list of worthy local, national and international charities and recommends where to allocate the funds each year. With priority given to women's and children's causes, the final list is presented and voted on each spring by all the women of the church. A list of these charities is kept in the shop for interested customers. The Rummage Room reports that a total of over 4 million dollars has been given to charities over its fifty years of operation. On average, current allocations total approximately \$150,000 per year.
