us.



SECOND LESSON

Luke 6: 17-26 The Message

Coming down off the mountain with them, he stood on a plain surrounded by disciples, and was soon joined by a huge congregation from all over Judea and Jerusalem, even from the seaside towns of Tyre and Sidon. They had come both to hear him and to be cured of their diseases. Those disturbed by evil spirits were healed. Everyone was trying to touch him—so much energy surging from him, so many people healed! Then he spoke:

You're blessed when you've lost it all. God's kingdom is there for the finding.

You're blessed when you're ravenously hungry. Then you're ready for the Messianic meal.

You're blessed when the tears flow freely. Joy comes with the morning.

"Count yourself blessed every time someone cuts you down or throws you out, every time someone smears or blackens your name to discredit me. What it means is that the truth

is too close for comfort and that that person is uncomfortable. You can be glad when that happens—skip like a lamb, if you like!—for even though they don't like it, I do... and all heaven applauds. And know that you are in good company; my preachers and witnesses have always been treated like this.

But it's trouble ahead if you think you have it made. What you have is all you'll ever get.

And it's trouble ahead if you're satisfied with yourself. Your self will not satisfy you for long.

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MUSIC NOTES

As February is *Black History Month*, most of the music sung or played in worship during the month will be of a gospel or spiritual nature.

The prelude is based on the spiritual "Honor, Honor" by Calvin Taylor, music publisher, concert performer, and recording artist. The lyrics to the tune are:

Taylor received the Bachelor of Music degree from Oberlin College Conservatory of Music, Master of Music degree from The University of Michigan, Diploma from the Grove School of Music, and the Doctor of Musical Arts Degree from the University of Kentucky.

The Chancel Choir anthem, "I dream a world" was written with lyrics based on the poem "I dream a world" by Langston Hughes (text at the anthem spot above). André Thomas is retired from Florida State University where he served as Director of Choral Activities for 35 years. He most recently served as interim Director of Choral Activities at Yale University for the 2020-2021 season.

During the offertory, Linnea Conley sings "I feel the spirit moving" arranged by Mark Hayes. This solo combines two familiar songs, "Old time religion" and "Every time I feel the spirit". Mark Hayes is a Kansas City based composer whose compositions and arrangements are known for their unique American sound, drawing from such diverse musical styles such as gospel, jazz, pop, folk and classical. His personal catalog, totaling over 1,500 published works, includes work for solo voice, solo piano, multiple pianos, orchestra, jazz combo, small instrumental ensembles, and choruses of all kinds.
